Waldwick Presents the Keys to a Building that will be Home for Affordable Housing.




On a bright sunny day in Waldwick, Mayor Russell Litchult presented the keys to 101 Wyckoff Avenue to Habitat. Members of the press, the Habitat Board of Directors and staff along with members of the municipality and those who were influential in helping us obtain this property were all present to witness the signing of the deed over to Habitat Bergen. It was an exciting day for us and the rain held off until everyone had left the site.

We hope to begin construction sometime in October after all permits are obtained. The site will be the new home to four families in need of safe and affordable housing. We will renovate this existing 5,100 square foot building into two 2 bedroom suites; one 3 bedroom suite; and one 4 bedroom suite. We will begin the marketing process in order to select families as soon as possible.

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Greetings from the Executive Director

Dear Friends:

This is a very exciting time for Habitat for Humanity of Bergen County. For the very first time we are looking at building homes for families in need in three scattered sites in Bergen County. On July 28th on a sunny bright day, the Mayor of Waldwick turned over the keys to 101 Wyckoff Avenue to the Habitat Board of Directors. We hope to begin work shortly and turn this blighted building into four (4) beautiful homes. In addition to Waldwick, we will begin working on the renovation of an existing building in Garfield which, when completed, will be the new home of Zoe's Place, an organization dedicated to housing teenaged mothers and their babies. We also anticipate that

the back lot in Garfield will eventually be the site of affordable housing for families in need. Currently we are working with the municipality of Oradell where plans are underway to build four (4) units of housing in this very upscale community.

For families who might never have the opportunity of owning their very first home, Habitat is making dreams come true by building more homes in one year then ever before. But, as I often say, we can't do it alone. More then ever we need your support. Building homes, even with volunteer labor, is a costly project. Building costs can reach \$150,000 for each home built. Although we pray that our economic conditions will change, the outlook remains dismal and funding has become harder to achieve.

We hope that you are enjoying your summer (in between the rain drops) and are looking forward to helping us build Habitat homes. The more volunteers we have, the more homes we can build. Thank you for being there for us over the last fifteen years in Bergen County.

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Hammers and Nails by Bob Preis

Hi Everyone!

Bob Preis here, Director of Construction for Habitat Bergen.

Last time we finished the house at the footings. After the footing inspection by the town, the work begins on erecting the forms for the poured concrete solid foundation. We use solid foundations rather than porous cinderblock foundations to insure no leakage. Plus, it's a must in a flood zone.

As soon as the forms are in place, the mason orders a concrete pump truck where a giant hose is worked around the tops of the forms and the concrete is poured. While the concrete is still wet in the forms, we insert a threaded rod in the center of the foundation to be able to bolt down the first piece of pressure treated 2×6 for the beginning of the wood framing.

Here comes the lumber truck loaded with dimensional lumber (2x4's, 2x6's, 2x8's and 2x10's) ready to be dropped off all at once in bundles. The lumber is shipped in the order to be used first. We are now ready to begin the perimeter framing. Since Habitat for Humanity of Bergen County is building as green as we possibly can, we use 2 x 6's instead of 2 x 4's in the perimeter framing so that we can use the thicker R-19 factor insulation. Once the inspection of the foundation is made by the town, we can begin framing the entire house. Next issue: Framing
